

CHECK YOUR TICKETS – It might sound obvious, but make sure you've got the right venue and the right date and don't forget your tickets. It's helpful to know which entrance you need to use and what time the concert starts – if you have any questions, check with the venue.

PLAN YOUR JOURNEY – Many concerts start close to rush hour, so the traffic may be heavy around the venue and car parks. Give yourself enough time to find the venue, park the car, enter the venue – which might involve queuing – and find your seats before the concert starts.

MEETING POINT – If your children are old enough to go to concerts on their own or with friends, drop them off in a safe place and ensure they know where to meet you after the show and how to contact you if the concert ends earlier than expected. (The venue may have designated areas for drop-off and collection – please check)

DRINKS – Concerts are exciting and it can be hot work cheering and dancing for your favourite pop star for three hours! Make sure that your children have enough cash to buy a drink in the venue, as for safety reasons most venues may not allow bottles or cans to be brought in.

HELP – If your children have any problems or difficulties during the event, they should tell a seating steward – they will be happy to help.
